ARCADEA REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

YEAR ENDED 31 March 2012

The Arcadea Management Board, have pleasure in presenting their report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2012.

Reference and administrative information

Reference and administrative details are shown in the schedule of members of the committee and professional advisors on page i of the report and financial statements.

Structure, governance and management

Governing documents

The organisation is a charity the constitution was adopted 2 February 1995 as amended 19 September 1998 and 20 September 2004. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the organisations memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005)'.

Appointment of Trustees

New trustees are appointed at any point during the year. Our aim is to appoint trustees with skills and experience relevant to the Third Sector and to the specialism of our service delivery. Trustees are recruited through personal recommendations from existing trustees, their contacts, and the staff team.

Organisation

The management board meets quarterly and deals with the administration of the charity encompassing the strategic vision, financial accountability and risk management.

The operational management of the organisation is undertaken by the paid staff team.

Risk management

The management committee has conducted its own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. Significant external risks to funding have led to the development of a strategic plan which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and for ensuring the consistent quality of the delivery of all operational aspects of the charitable company. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

Chair's Statement

11-12 was the beginning of an exciting new and challenging phase for Arcadea. With relatively new staff in place, our first substantial public sector contract to deliver and an emerging relationship with the British Institute of Human Rights to develop, the year started on a positive note and continued throughout in that vein.

Alongside our plan to deliver a wide range of new work, we also embarked on the first year of a three-year strategy that aims to:

- a) Shield the organisation from the economic downturn.
- b) Counter the organisations reliance on funding from external sources and through earned income, move it towards a degree of core financial sustainability.
- c) Allow us to target more effectively those individuals and communities in most need.
- d) Develop a new approach to our collaborative work with the third sector and within public sector health and social care.

The year began with work on our newly won contract from Newcastle City Council to create a Cultural Choice Hub (the Hub) for and with Learning Disabled People in Newcastle.

The purpose of the contract was to build a suite of cultural and creative services that would provide both an alternative to day centre provision and forward the inclusion of learning disabled people in mainstream cultural activity.

The HUB was launched in September with a workshop festival that saw 90 learning disabled people engage with cultural organisations from around the city (such as the Baltic, the Sage and the Theatre Royal) in a wide range of activity. This included family history/personal heritage, cake decorating, drumming, drama, dance and cartooning. The day was a huge success and everyone we spoke to about the festival asked for similar events to happen more often.

Out of the festival we established the Hub steering group. Made up largely of Learning Disabled People this group worked alongside our staff and helped to inform the way the HUB developed and now operates.

One of our targets for the year was to establish a paid for cultural 'day service.' The aim of this service is to be an alternative to the more traditional day care approach by offering a wide range of cultural activity that is supported by professional artists as well as by becoming recognised as a significant creative presence within the city.

In the latter part of the year we established this service. Also known as the HUB, it quickly attracted interest and membership from across the city and is now a swiftly growing cultural enterprise.

One of the first "jobs" the Hub members were asked to undertake was by Newcastle Adult Services. This was to rebrand and relaunch the Blue Card. Working closely with Health and Safeguarding peers, the Blue Card became a discreet ID scheme that provides Learning Disabled People with two safety nets. The first is a simple contact

protocol that comes into play should an individual become lost or distressed, the second, which is linked to the NHS, is a straightforward alert for members of the emergency services. Members of the Hub 'Blue Card Group' developed the look and feel of the scheme and the outreach programme that accompanies it.

Forwarding creative inclusion and cultural equality are two of the main aims of Arcadea. During the year our work in this area included launching a new project called Hub Tickets. Loosely modeled on the Shape London Ticket Scheme, the project is membership based, an application must be applied for and proof of entitlement must be provided. On joining members receive a credit card style membership card that can be used at most of Newcastle's cultural venues to secure a free ticket for an accompanying carer or support worker. The scheme will be rolled out across the region in 12/13.

Alongside and to support Hub Tickets during the year we launched an accessible 'What's On' website. On evaluating the way the site was being used we discovered that a large number of Learning Disabled People either don't have access to the internet and or prefer to receive information in print form. In the light of this we produced our first printed regular newsletter for learning disabled people. As far as we are aware, in Newcastle this is the only print news specifically designed for Learning Disabled People.

Arcadea's mission is not tied solely to working with Learning Disabled People, in the past and with support from the Arts Council of England the organisation has worked to support and promote the artistic and cultural equality of all disabled people.

We knew at the beginning of the year that this would be the last year, for a while, that we received regular funding from the Arts Council of England. The Arts Council have been very supportive of our plans for 2011 2012, and worked with us to deliver these and ensure that the organisation continued to exist post ACE funding.

As part of this plan we embarked on a major piece of work in partnership with the British Institute of Human Rights (BIHR). Our shared aim being to deepen the understanding amongst disabled artist and disabled people in the region of Human Rights, using the arts as a medium to examine and communicate the UK Human Rights Act.

We ran eight Human Rights workshops for artists and community groups throughout the region. Some of these were facilitated by local disabled artists who were trained as part of the project by the BIHR and some by BIHR trainers themselves. The impact of this project was considerable, for many of the participants it brought Human Rights to life, for others it was an engaging introduction to a set of vital understandings.

The first phase of the project ended with an exhibition at the Centre for Life. Opened by the Dean of Law at Northumbria University, the show featured at least one piece of work or contribution from each of the 42 people who had taken part in the project during the year. The show featured pieces by established and award winning artists sitting alongside a rap video by learning disabled people, alongside poetry by members of an emerging disability advocacy group from mid Northumberland.

The project is due to continue into 12 /3 when we will focus the work on groups of learning disabled people in Hartlepool and in Newcastle

Our achievements during the year have been numerous; the people we have worked with have been extremely supportive. The new relationships and partnerships we have formed will prove extremely beneficial to the organisation, its partners and its stakeholders. There are challenges ahead that that will inhibit cultural equality and we will work to address these. Issues such as transport, care support in arts venues and local government cuts being not least of these, but all of which we will continue to work to overcome and find solutions for.

Financially the year saw the organisation take huge leaps towards reducing its dependence on grant aid to deliver its core work. Members of the board have worked hard with the staff to make this happen and should be justly proud of their achievements.

While discussing financial matters it is worth noting that the difference in the accounts for years 2010/2011 and 2011/2012 is in part due to the organisation having no staff wages to pay during first 6 months of 2010/11 as well as the funding for our contract with Newcastle City Council being paid at the end of 2010/11 for use in 2011/12.

Finally I would like to thank all of our staff, who having started with us only 6 months earlier, took us into the year full of hope and vision and brought us out of the year with a solid foundation from which to build new partnerships and growth in 2012/2013.

Financial Review

Arcadea is funded by principally by grant income from the Arts Council. The total income for the year was £72,994 (2011: £113,787) being an decrease of 36 per cent. This income is allocated across respective funds on the Statement of Financial Activities in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 2005.

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 March 2012, shows a deficit across all funds of £20,760 (2011: surplus £57,600).

The Balance Sheet at 31 March 2012 shows total funds carried forward of £41,301 (2011: £62,060) of which £14,097 (2011: £34,045) are restricted funds.

Reserves policy

Arcadea has built up a small level of reserves over the years to enable it to even out some of the "highs and lows" of income generation. In the coming year the reserves that are held will be stretched to cover potential shortfalls from funding as a result of cuts. At 31 March 2012 reserves represents just over 4 months of running costs which the trustees believe to be prudent in light of challenges faced in securing funding.

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

Statement of Trustee Responsibilities

The trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of the Companies Act, are also responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
